Introduction

The Higher Education Support (Student Services, Amenities, Representation and Advocacy) Guidelines 2022 (SSARA Guidelines) require higher education providers to provide a publicly available report on student services and amenities fee (SSAF) allocations and actual expenditure for the year as part of their annual reporting and in the form approved by the Minister. This SSAF Allocation Report is the form approved by the Minister.

The information provided in this SSAF Allocation Report does **not** require auditing by a financial accountant. The SSAF <u>expenditure reporting is a separate process and remains unchanged</u>, more information can be found in the <u>Financial Statements Guidelines</u> for Table A and B providers, and in the <u>Financial Viability Instructions: Applicants and Providers of FEE-HELP (FVI)</u> for all other approved providers.

SSAF Consultation and Achievements

In 2023, all Higher Education students were given the opportunity to provide feedback on the allocation of 2024 SSAF expenditure via the Higher Education Course Experience Survey.

Students were asked to rank 8 priority areas in order of importance. Respondents ranked the priority areas in order of importance as follows:

- 1. Health and wellbeing related activities and services (70% of students ranked this in the top three priority areas)
- 2. Student clubs and societies (67% of students ranked this in the top three priority areas)
- 3. Leadership and professional development opportunities (54% of students ranked this in the top three priority areas)
- 4. Job and career support services and resources (53% of students ranked this in the top three priority areas)
- 5. Campus activities (50% of students ranked this in the top three priority areas)
- 6. Grants for student-led projects that benefit the student community (40% of students ranked this in the top three priority areas)
- 7. Holmesglen merchandise i.e. branded clothing (27% of students ranked this in the top three priority areas)
- 8. Other please specify (0% of students chose this option with no other options specified)

Students were also asked questions relating to their awareness of the SSAF and how it is spent at Holmesglen. The results indicated that:

- 42% of respondents had no awareness to very little awareness of the SSAF
- 73% of respondents were not at all aware or had very little awareness of the services and amenities funded through the SSAF
- 55% of respondents said they did not value or valued very little being able to participate in services and activities funded through the SSAF
- 44% of respondents said the were not confident at all or had very little confidence that the SSAF funds were being spent well

The four responses above indicate more work needs to be done to raise awareness of the value of the SSAF and the services and activities that it funds. Strengthening Holmesglen's Student Association as part of our transition plan to comply with Section 19-39 of the Higher Education Support Act 2023 and the Higher Education Support (Student Services, Amenities, Representation and Advocacy) Guidelines 2022 will go towards addressing this. Other strategies to promote the SSAF and services that it funds are under development.

In addition to the Higher Education Course Experience Survey, Holmesglen's Student Representative Council (SRC) provide feedback to the Student Life team, Chief Executive and Holmesglen Board regarding issues and services that are important to them.

Minutes from SRC meetings indicated that students value:

- Health and wellbeing related services and activities
- Diversity and inclusion related initiatives and campus activities
- Digital orientation materials that can be referred to at the student's own pace post-orientation

SSAF continues to be spent on resourcing our student support and wellbeing services, including personal counselling, welfare and disability support services. In addition, our Student Life team provide a range of on campus and off campus recreational activities and activities that promote health, wellbeing and diversity and inclusion.

Some of the initiatives and activities supported by the SSAF and delivered by the Student Life team in collaboration with students and other Institute staff include:

Clubs or other associations

- Holmesglen's indoor soccer team, the Holmesglen Sharks, where higher education students participated in indoor soccer against other education providers. While this club was enjoyed by higher education students, due to low participation rates, this is currently under review.
- Holmesglen's <u>Pride Network</u>, a community of students and staff who help shape the culture, activity and communication relating to pride initiatives and strategies at the Institute. The network strives to foster acceptance, celebrate diversity, and promote a sense of belonging among LGBTIQ+ staff and students and their allies.
- The Nursing Student Representative Committee received funding towards celebrating International Nurses Day.

Campus activities including "O" Week and recognition of other cultural and significant days

- Womnjeka or "O" week was delivered across all of Holmesglen's campuses in Semesters 1 & 2. Activities included promotion of support and wellbeing services and clubs such as the Pride Network, giveaways, a wellbeing day and study support sessions.
- Celebration of cultural and other significant days such as:
 - ANZAC Day
 - o IDAHOBIT
 - o Midsumma Festival
 - Multicultural week
 - o NAIDOC Week
 - o RUOK?

- Respect and Equality in TAFE
- o Wear It Purple Day
- Promotion of International Women's Day student awards and scholarships
- Catering for on campus events

Professional development opportunities for students

 Students in our Bachelor of Sports Media had the opportunity to participate in a Commentary Mentoring Program with Brett Phillips, Australia's leading tennis expert, commentator and host. The program consisted of four 1:1 mentoring sessions covering the art of commentary and the opportunity to commentate a game.

Subsidised student trips

Students were able to participate in a range of subsidised trips, including:

- Holmesglen at Eildon
- Peninsula Hot Springs
- Mt Buller Snow Trip
- Dreamtime at the 'G'

Although funding allocated for employment and careers services was spent on other allowable expenses, students still had access to a range of employment related services through the <u>Holmesglen Employment Centre</u>, including careers counselling and through attendance at the Holmesglen Employment Centre Jobs Fair.

Although funding allocation for merchandise was spent on other allowable expenses, there was plenty of merchandise available for students through existing stock on hand and other funding sources.

All SSAF funds received were spent on allowable expenditure items.

Holmesglen has submitted a four year transition plan to meet compliance against the intent of the 2024-25 Budget measure requiring providers to allocate a minimum of 40 per cent of SSAF revenue collected to student-led organisations. The four year plan outlines the steps we will take to meet the requirements of Section 19-39 of the Higher Education Support Act 2023 and the Higher Education Support (Student Services, Amenities, Representation and Advocacy) Guidelines 2022. The transition plan was approved the Department of Education on 23 April 2025.

In 2025, the first year of our plan will focus on:

- Strengthening the profile of the Holmesglen Student Association to work towards being a majority student led organization
- Appointing a Graduate Officer Student Voice and Partnership to lead the Student Representative Council (SRC) the peak body that will oversee the Holmesglen Student Association and support student voice and partnership
- Strengthening the relationship between Holmesglen's SRC and faculty level SRCs to embed student voice at all levels
- Developing an election process for SRC members
- Developing a comprehensive suite of documents and processes including:
 - o Terms of Reference for the SRC and decision making powers and duties
 - o Raising awareness of the SSAF and expenditure of funds
 - o Ensuring the SRC has oversight of SSAF expenditure
 - o An annual reporting process for SSAF expenditure, overseen by the SRC
 - Policies and procedures for record keeping, risk management, fraud prevention and financial controls for the Student Association

Promotion of health and wellbeing services

- Students participated in a range of workshops that promoted health and wellbeing and support services available. Topics included:
 - o Healthy relationships, sexual harassment and consent
 - Anxiety and depression
 - Alcohol and other drugs

³ Note: Students are categorised as full-time or part-time students based on the total EFTSL value of the units of study they undertook in [insert reported year].
